#### Welcome to IB Visual Arts

IB Visual Arts is a creative and intellectually challenging course that explores art-making, critical analysis, and the role of art in society. This course encourages students to experiment with various media, investigate artistic traditions, and reflect on their artistic journey through a process portfolio, comparative study, and curated exhibition.

#### **Course Overview**

The course is divided into three main components: the Process Portfolio (PP), Comparative Study (CS), and Exhibition. Each component is designed to help students develop as creators, thinkers, and reflective practitioners.

## Semester 1: September 2025 – January 2026

### 1. Exploring Formal Elements and Techniques

 Topics: Color theory, visual analysis, art movements, and technical workshops.

#### Activities:

- Compare and contrast artworks.
- Reflect on art-making processes in journals.
- Participate in guided workshops on painting, printmaking, and sculpture.
- Outcome: Students begin their Process Portfolio with experiments and reflections.

#### 2. Art and Cultural Identity

 Topics: Symbols in cultural art, global perspectives on identity, and colonialism in art.

#### Activities:

- Analyze Indigenous and global art forms.
- Create works inspired by cultural research.

 Outcome: Initial development of Comparative Study with selected artists and themes.

# 3. Studio Work and Self-Expression

o **Topics:** Developing independent studio projects and curatorial skills.

#### Activities:

- Draft self-portrait projects.
- Explore personal themes through mixed media and experimental approaches.
- Outcome: Document early stages of exhibition work in journals.

### Semester 2: February 2026 – May 2027

### 1. Comparative Study and Art Theory

o **Topics:** In-depth research on chosen artists, formal and contextual analysis.

#### Activities:

- Complete and refine the Comparative Study.
- Link analysis to Theory of Knowledge (TOK) themes, such as "Art and Society."
- Outcome: Submit the Comparative Study for IB evaluation.

## 2. Curating and Exhibition Preparation

 Topics: Planning an art exhibition, writing curatorial rationales, and hanging styles.

#### Activities:

- Visit local galleries and reflect on curatorial methods.
- Finalize and display a cohesive body of work.
- o **Outcome:** Submit the final exhibition with rationale and photographs.

## 3. Finalizing the Process Portfolio

 Topics: Documenting artistic processes, refining portfolio slides, and peer critiques.

#### Activities:

- Create detailed slides showing creative experimentation and development.
- Use IB rubrics to ensure all criteria are addressed.
- o **Outcome:** Submit the Process Portfolio for IB assessment.

#### Assessments

## 1. Process Portfolio (PP):

- A collection of journal reflections, visual experiments, and creative development.
- o **Deadline:** May 2027.

## 2. Comparative Study (CS):

- A critical analysis of at least three artworks from different contexts.
- Deadline: March 2027.

#### 3. Exhibition:

- o A curated display of 8–11 artworks with a written curatorial rationale.
- o **Deadline:** April 2027.

## **Skill Development**

- Artistic Techniques: Experiment with various media and methods.
- **Critical Analysis:** Compare and interpret artworks from diverse cultural perspectives.
- Curatorial Skills: Plan and present a professional-quality exhibition.
- **Communication:** Articulate artistic intentions and processes through writing and presentations.
